Embracing Renewal: Finding Hope in Easter's Promise

As we journey through the season of Eastertide (the 50 days between Easter Sunday and Pentecost), we are invited to contemplate the life-changing message of hope we just celebrated on Easter Sunday. In the resurrection of Jesus Christ, we find not only triumph over death but also the promise of new beginnings, even in the most desolate and broken parts of our world.

Just as Jesus emerged victorious from the tomb, so too can we find hope in the midst of our own struggles and challenges. In the brokenness of our world, where pain and suffering often seem to overshadow the light, Easter reminds us that God's love is relentless and His power to transform is boundless.

I would challenge us this month to consider the areas of our lives that may be in need of renewal. As we heard that first week in Lent when we began our sermon series on Jesus' I Am statements, Jesus said, "I am the Light of the world, whoever follows me will not walk in darkness but will have the light of life" (John 8:12).

May this Easter season be a time of profound transformation and renewal in our lives, as we embrace the hope and light of Christ.

WAYS TO HELP A LOCAL BENEVOLENCE

Harvest Share Food Pantry is a local benevolence that helps meet the needs of the homeless as well as families with children and our older citizens who struggle to make ends meet. This year, due to bad weather and a new location, their main annual fundraiser, Soup-N-Bowl, fell short of its goal. Two ways to make up for this shortage are donations and volunteering.

As to food specifics, Aldi's, Food Lion and Dollar General donate bread and produce; the government sends rice, dried beans, and soup. The main needs are canned vegetables, fruit, tuna and salmon, Vienna sausages, ramen noodles, oatmeal, and white bread. The homeless appreciate pop top cans.

Our church is scheduling a special offering and food drive to help Harvest Share stock up. Food donations may be brought to the gathering space during the month of April. Checks may be made out to First Presbyterian Church; specify Harvest Share on the memo line.

Volunteer jobs range from taking home dog food to divide into give-away size bags to spending a couple of hours onsite at 419 West 9th Street sorting/organizing food or cleaning. If you have a garden or chickens, surplus vegetables and fresh eggs are welcome donations. Also, prayers for Harvest Share are always needed and appreciated.

Holy Smokers

On Saturday, March 23, the Holy Smokers fired up the grill to cook Boston butts for the Family Center's biggest fundraiser of the year, the Reverse Raffle. They prepared enough BBQ to feed 400 people. All of the proceeds from the Reverse Raffle help the Family Center provide assistance to those in need.

Mission Trip-July 8-13

The Mission Committee is planning an intergenerational service trip to Bluefield, West Virginia the week of July 8-13. The town of Bluefield was once known as little New York. Since the fall of the coal industry, downtown buildings have become vacant and only about 9,000 people live in this mountain oasis. Our team will work on light repair projects for some of the poorer residents of this community while helping to meet the physical and spiritual needs of families in the area.

While serving in Bluefield we will lodge at Bluefield First Church of the Nazarene. The church offers dining and meeting facilities, we will sleep in rooms that hold 8-10 campers. Breakfast and dinner will be served in the dining hall. Lunch will be provided at worksites.




We will be partnering with Mission Discovery. Mission Discovery trips aim to help developing communities. Teams of volunteers build homes for families in need, love on orphans, feed the hungry, clothe and educate school children, provide medical care and empower churches to bring hope to their

communities. The Mission Discovery Staff arranges food, lodging, and logistics so volunteers will be effective from day one. Each night they offer a worship service to provide an atmosphere to come together and reflect on what we experience during the day.
